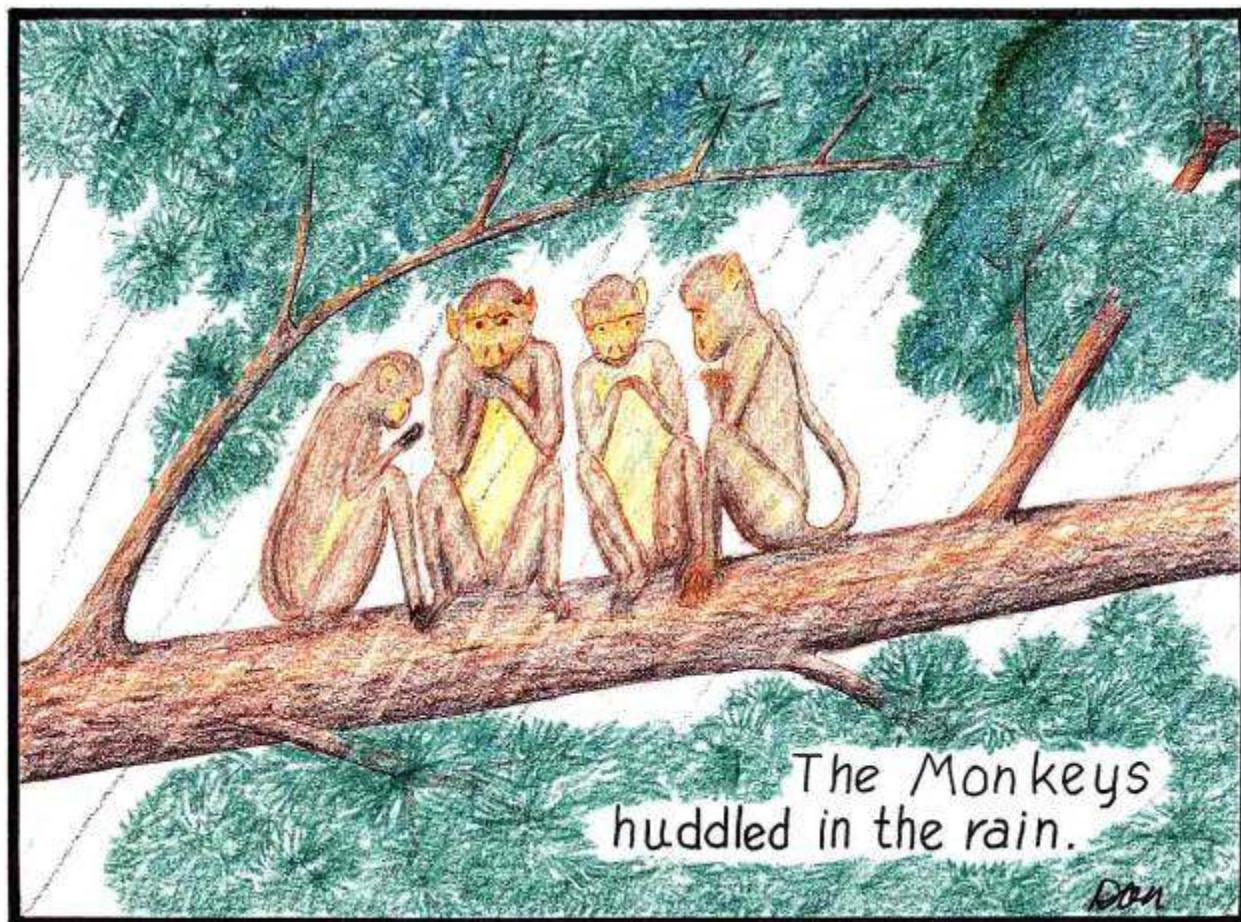

"Yes." "Yes." "Yes." They all agreed and went on talking about how they could make a fine *kwi* (civilized) house.

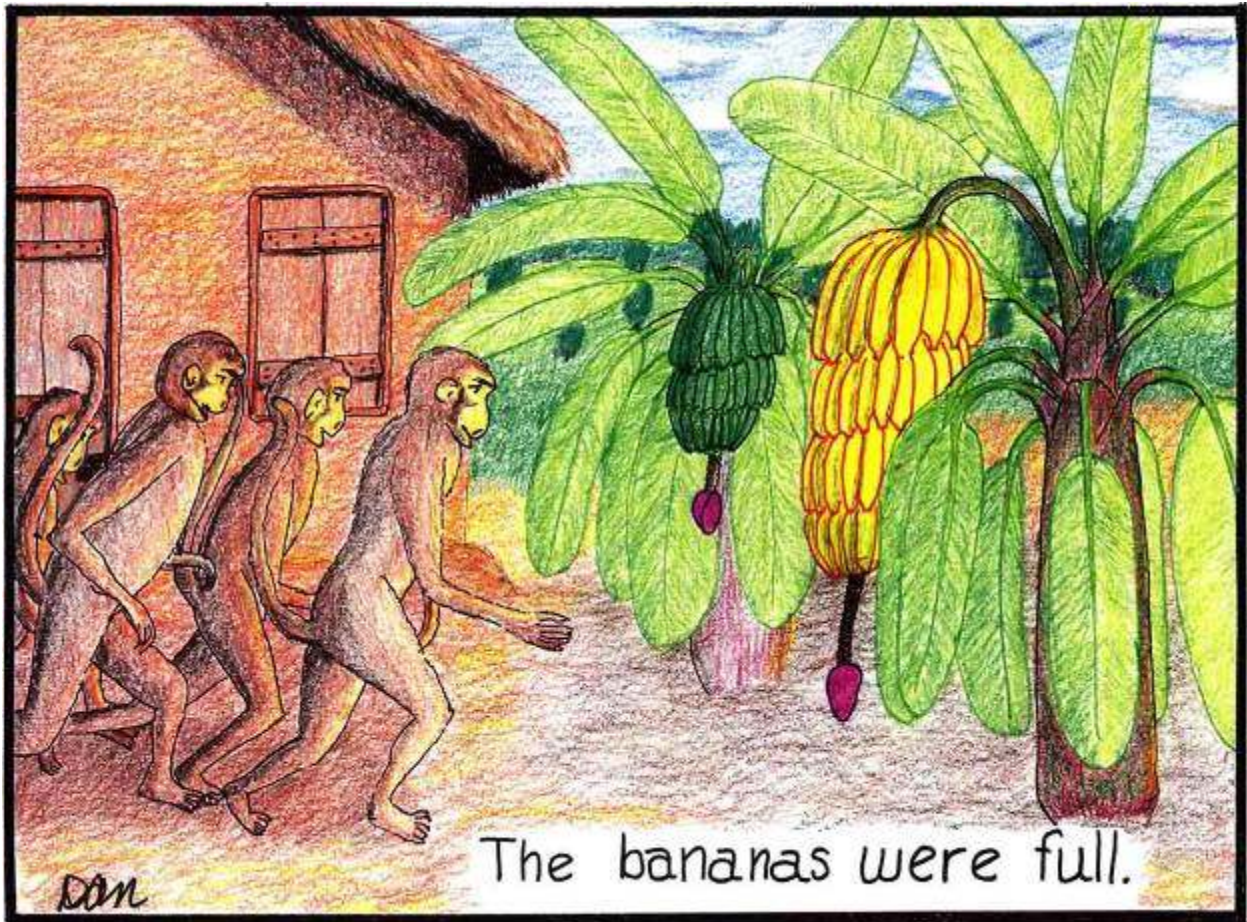
Then the rain stopped and the sun began to shine.
